you can run the dishwasher and the shower at the same time. The kitchen, bathrooms and washer/dryer are all clustered into the center of the house (not all in the same room, of course), so water doesn't need to move through pipes more than is necessary.

The products inside are also energy-efficient. Some were given to the project before they were made available to the public, including LED lights by Philips that line the kitchen/living area, and a compact GE washer/dryer that is vent-free. Part of the house was paid for by a NYSERDA grant for all the building science and technology work, including computer modeling.

Nick Ford, who has led the building crew during most of the house's construction, learned how all the technology worked step-by-step.

"I knew I was going to be building a super-airtight structure," he said. "I educated myself really quickly right after the frame raising, so I could know the principles behind it and know what I had to achieve."

"This whole project is so well thought out. It's totally going to revolutionize the whole building industry," he continued. "Nothing's wasted."

The asking price is \$595,000.

"There has been some interest on the real estate side," said Stratton. "There's been a lot of interest in the methodology and the whole passive technique."

The house's website (www.thegoodhome.com) gets hundreds of hits a day, Wedlick said, and there have been plenty of requests for tours and interviews — during construction, a group of students from the City University of New York took an educational tour as well.

" NF-Absolutely correct. What people have to do is unthink. There are plenty of low tech solutions to saving energy. You don't need to have all the bells and whistles to get by. Look at straw bale houses (timber frame) with bales as insulation and not load-bearing. You have an r value of at least 50. Combine that with the benefits of passive and active solar heating, an efficient hydronic heating system or even an efficient woodstove and you can build a home which could be heated and cooled for a lot less than a conventional home. You would need a lot of money to build the house in the article, or a whole lot less to build a similarly efficient but not as fancy home which works as well. "

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
